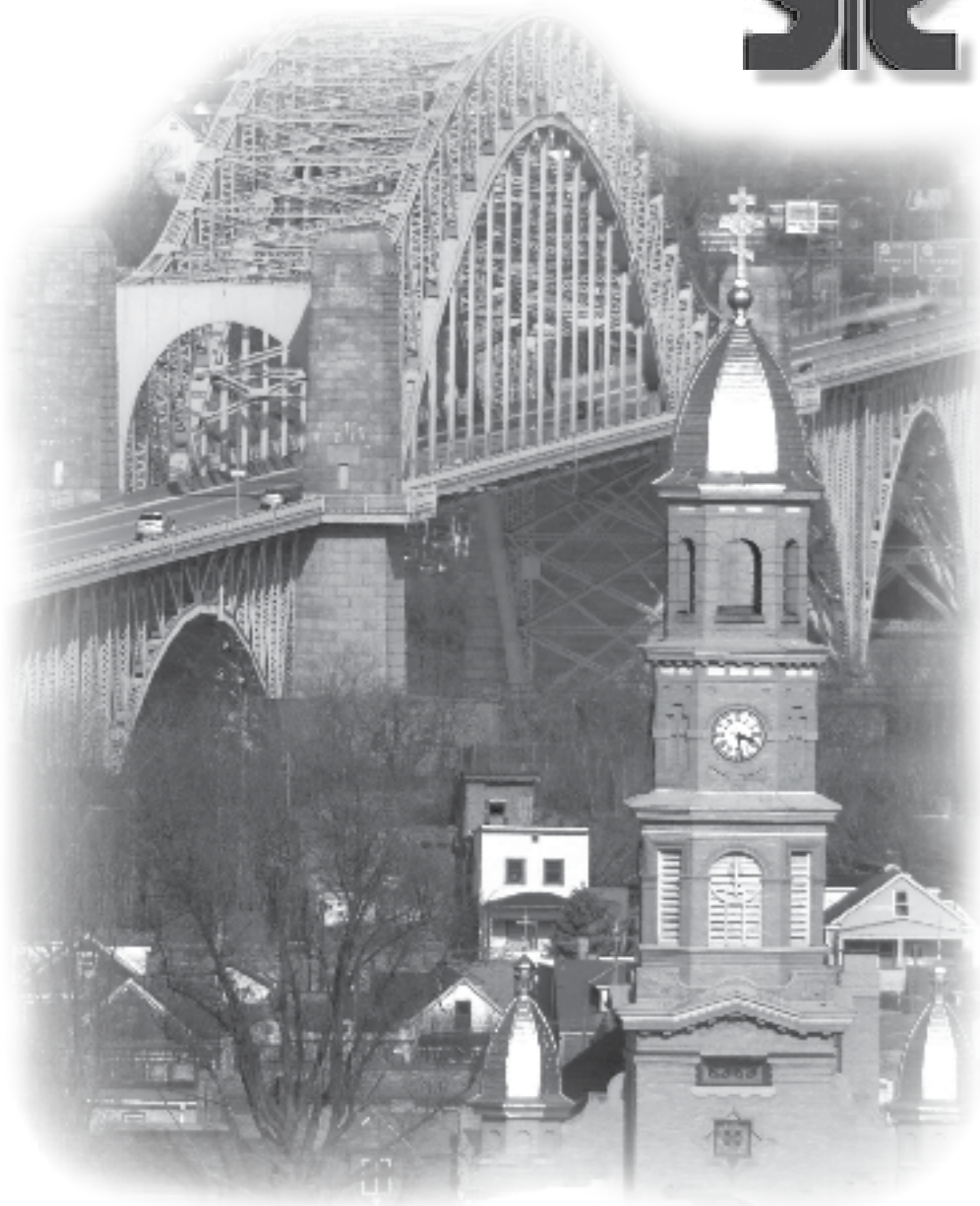

Rev. Dr. Robert Welsh



The Rev. Dr. Robert Welsh is an ordained minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), and the president of the Council on Christian Unity since January 1, 1999. Dr. Welsh graduated from Transylvania University (BA), and Lexington Theological Seminary (D.Min). He has done post-graduate study at the Ecumenical Institute of the World Council

of Churches in Geneva, Switzerland, and at Westminster College, Cambridge, England. Dr. Welsh is married to Nancy Moorhead Welsh, and has two grown children, and two grandchildren.

WEDNESDAY PLENARY ON RACISM

Rev. Canon Harold T. Lewis

The Rev. Harold T. Lewis has been the rector of Calvary Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, since 1996. Since his ordination in 1971, he has served congregations in Honduras, England, Washington, DC, New Haven, CT and his native Brooklyn, NY. From 1983 until 1994, he served on the staff of the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church as Director of the Office of Black Ministries. He holds a Bachelor of Arts from McGill University, a Master of Divinity from Yale, and a Doctor of



Philosophy (in theology) from the University of Birmingham (England). Among Dr. Lewis' publications are *A Church for the Future: South Africa as the Crucible for Anglicanism in a New Century*; and *Yet With a Steady Beat: the African American Struggle for Recognition in the Episcopal Church*. A musician who enjoys accompanying soloists, he has written hymns which have been published in *Lift Every Voice and Sing II: An African American Hymnal*; *Wonder Love and Praise*, and *This Far By Faith*.

Rev. Dr. Mark Allan Powell

The Rev. Dr. Mark Allan Powell is Professor of New Testament at Trinity Lutheran Seminary. He is editor of the *HarperCollins Bible Dictionary* and author of more than 25 books on the Bible and religion, including the widely used textbook, *Introducing the New Testament* (Baker Academic). He has also written in the areas of spiritual formation *Loving Jesus*, stewardship *Giving To God*, and homiletics *What Do They Hear?: Bridging the Gap between Pulpit and Pew*. Powell has chaired the Matthew Group and the Historical Jesus Section of the Society of Biblical Literature and for many years has served as the only Protestant on the Executive Committee of the Catholic Biblical Association.

Brother Jeffrey Gros, FSC

Brother Jeffrey Gros, FSC, served ten years as Director of Faith and Order for the National Council of Churches, and then 14 years as Associate Director of the Secretariat for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs at the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Brother Gros is currently distinguished professor of Ecumenism and Historical Theology at Memphis Theological Seminary, and Academic Dean on the Institute for Catholic Ecumenical Leadership. Brother Gros received a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Master of Education (Biology Education) degree from St. Mary's University of Minnesota. He earned a Masters degree in Theology from Marquette University and a Ph.D in Theology from Fordham University. Brother Gros has been involved in editing numerous books including: *Introduction to Ecumenism* (with Ann Riggs, Eamon McManus, New York: Paulist Press, 1998); *The Ecumenical Christian Dialogues and the Catechism of the Catholic Church* (coedited with Daniel Mulhall, Paulist Press, 2006); with Steven Bevans, SVD, *Evangelization and Religious Freedom: Ad Gentes, Dignitatis Humanae*, (New York: Paulist Press, 2008); with colleagues, *Growth in Agreement II & III*, (Geneva/Grand Rapids: World Council of Churches/Eerdmans).

1 Ecumenism and Interreligious Affairs

Congratulations! Your diocese, synod or presbytery has just appointed you Ecumenical/Interreligious Officer and sent you to the National Workshop! What are you going to do now?! 2 Ecumenical Consultation on Ethical Decisions

Level 2 (Session II & III)

Ethical and moral issues are challenges to ecumenical relationship. How should there be ecumenical consultation as a church body is considering a decision on moral or ethical issues? The presenter will provide a framework for approaching ethical and moral concerns from his theological, ecclesiological and ecumenical perspective.

3 Spiritual Ecumenism

Spiritual ecumenism is grounded in prayer and focused on God's presence in our world and in the unity we share in Christ. Deeper prayer and spiritual discernment in our work together as followers of Jesus is an integral part of our common journey in mission and work to manifest the unity given in Christ. This seminar provides practical guidance in implementing and strengthening spiritual ecumenism – and that unity which finds expression in actions which express and build up our unity in Christ and with one another.

4 Harvesting the Fruits

Level 1 (Sessions I & II)

Focuses on Cardinal Kasper's Harvesting the Fruits: Basic Aspects of Christian Faith in Ecumenical Dialogue (2009) which explores the 39 reports produced, altogether, by the first four international bilateral dialogues involving the Catholic Church starting after Vatican II, and continuing until now; with the Lutheran World Federation, the World Methodist Council, the Anglican Communion, and the World Alliance of Reformed Churches. Each bilateral is significant and the study of the reports of any one would show how two communions are beginning to resolve long standing differences. But this project looks across all four together, trying to harvest levels of consensus/convergence achieved regarding four major areas: (1) fundamentals of common faith: Jesus Christ and the Trinity, (2) salvation, justification, sanctification, (3) the Church, (4) sacraments of baptism and Eucharist. Is there an emerging shared consensus/convergence among five Christian communions on these vital themes? If so, what are the implications for our ecumenical journey?

5 NewFire – Intergenerational Ecumenism

The NewFire network continues to build momentum, and add to the depth and diversity of participation of young adults with hearts for who the church is and what the church does. In a time of life transition, NewFire brings together young adult leaders from Catholic to Pentecostal, Orthodox to Brethren. NewFire continues to engage the world, hosting film screenings on young adult activism and race relations during Apartheid in South Africa, hosting a 3rd national gathering

of leaders, being involved in the paper discussions hosted by the NCC, and sponsoring seed grants for local young adult led ecumenical events nationwide. Building bridges between young adults with their home communions, NewFire expands our work in the Body of Christ by partnering with an ever-growing number of young adult engaged organizations. Join members of the NewFire Task Force to learn more about the spirit and content of this work, and how you and others in your communities can get involved.

6 A Tale of Two Pontiffs: Ecumenical and Interreligious

Level 3 (Sessions I & II)

Fr. Dennis McManus, Ph.D
(Catholic)

What's the difference between recent Popes? This seminar provides an overview of the ecumenical and interreligious policies of Popes John Paul II and Benedict XVI. It will examine the backgrounds – cultural, personal, theological – of each Pope and their developed thinking on how the Catholic Church can approach the establishment of good relations and the construction of dialogues with other religious communities. Attention will be given to present conflicts and likely outcomes and updates on current issues before the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

7 Global Christianity

Level 3 (Sessions II & III)

Dr. Scott Sunquist (PC-USA)

As Christian churches in the Northern Hemisphere are declining, the churches in the Southern Hemisphere are growing rapidly. Pentecostals and Evangelicals compete with established Christian traditions. New believers live alongside Muslim neighbors. The presenter will share his knowledge of Christianity in the global context, especially his recent sabbatical experiences in Malaysia.

8 The Church and The Holocaust

Level 3 (Sessions I & III)

Rabbi James Gibson (Reform)
Rev. Cynthia Bronson-Sweigert

What was the churches' role in the Holocaust? What are we teaching our seminarians and congregants about the Holocaust? Should Yom Hoshuah and Kristallnacht be commemorated by Christians? The presenters will share their experiences as partners in interfaith dialogue, social justice and service.

9 Orthodox Spirituality

Level 2 (Sessions II & III)

Fr. Bogdan Bucur (O)

The study of apocalyptic literature, of the Qumran Scrolls, and of later Jewish mysticism throws new and welcome light on the synthesis of doctrine, liturgical practices, and ascetic-mystical theories commonly referred to as "the spirituality of the Christian East." This seminar will explore specific points of continuity and discontinuity between Second Temple apocalypticism and Orthodox Christian spirituality: the notion of "open heavens" offering direct access to heavenly mysteries; the mirroring and interdependence between corporate liturgical experience, experience of the individual inner life, and the experience of celestial realities; the central importance given to biblical theophanies as entry-point into both reading the Scriptures and personal mystical experience; finally, the language of "ascent," "heavenly liturgy," "glorification," and "transformation" used to convey claims to extraordinary experience.

The NATIONAL WORKSHOP on CHRISTIAN UNITY

ORIGINS of the NATIONAL WORKSHOP

In 1963, a group of Roman Catholics in the context of Vatican II, saw a need to equip local leadership for the task of ecumenical ministry. In 1969, they invited leaders of other Christian communions to join them, and today the National Ecumenical Officers of the churches continue their oversight of the workshop, which is planned by national and local committees. The Workshop is sponsored by the National Ecumenical Officers Association. There are both denominational and ecumenical sessions during the workshop. This is the 43rd year of the National Workshop on Christian Unity, which celebrates the spirit of ecumenism by:

- Providing meeting seminars for all who are concerned with the ministry of Christian unity; laity, clergy, ecumenical officers, theologians, staff of ecumenical organizations;
- Stimulating an exchange of ideas and experiences among people concerned with Christian unity and the bodies they represent;



- Being a source and balance between national planning and local responsibility, general ecumenical discussions and particular interchurch conversations, and regional leadership efforts and local realities;
- Encouraging denominational networks to develop and serve as a framework within which they can interact; and
- Celebrating the unity that already exists among Christians and searching for ways to overcome the divisions that remain.

The NATIONAL WORKSHOP LOGO

The logo affirms the cross which is central to Christian unity. The elements on either side of the cross suggest hands of prayer embracing the reconciling cross, at the same time creating the outline of a chalice, which represents the real although imperfect communion of Christianity, and the anticipated full unity which is the goal of the ecumenical movement. The late John R. Fulton designed the logo for the National Workshop on Christian Unity.
